## **CONVENTION CONTESTS**

## Have We Got Some Contests for You at Anaheim!

**T**t looks like the Anaheim Special is shap-Ling up to be a terrific convention thanks to the efforts of the good folks out in the PSR and the various national committees. We on the national contest staff have also been busy making plans for a somewhat expanded program to provide you, the attendees, with a menu of contest choices that will tickle your fancy and entice you to bring Also in 1950, I married my present wife a model or two to share with your fellow hobbvists.

> For you PSR guys and gals, and we're hoping a lot of you will join in the festivities, the **PSR MODEL CONTEST** will be run in parallel with the national competition. The judging will all be done in one pool, but there will be a full spectrum of both place and special awards just for the PSR folks.

seen from the great southwest, more than one or two of you will have your arms full carrying away the both PSR and national awards.

Moving on to the national attractions, the first event I would like to put out there is the MODEL SHOWCASE. This is a noncompetitive, display-only event. Bring one of your favorite models. It doesn't have to be scratchbuilt or even complete, but something that would be interesting to your fellow modelers. Paperwork will be minimal, just enough to tell who you are and identify the model. All entrants will be recognized and receive a certificate of participation. Why do it? Why not, particularly if you have never brought anything into the contest room and may be a little apprehensive. We've done this event for years in the NER and it's very popular.

The **PEOPLE'S CHOICE** is next on the menu. This is a popular vote contest and includes six categories: locomotives, rolling stock, cabooses, structures, dioramas, and train (yup, a full train with engine and cars). This one's for the folks that may be too busy or may just not want to scratchbuild and put their gang-buster models together with lots of commercial parts and pieces. Again, the paperwork is pretty much zip.

First place awards will be given in the first five categories, and first, second, and third place awards for the favorite train. In addition, there will be five special awards, including the Creativity Award for the best structure of your own design, the Photo Match Award for best match-up of model and photo (this one's for you prototype modelers, and yes, you do need a photo.), the prestigious "Thumbs award" by our own Milt Moore, and finally, The People's Choice - Best of Show.

This contest is about sizzle: the neater and more spectacular it looks, the more votes you get. And, just to keep everyone on their toes, the models entered in the judged contest are also automatically eligible for the **PEOPLE's CHOICE** where the only judges are your fellow modelers. The only requirement is that they like what they see. If you are a first timer to the contest room and want to taste a little competition but aren't sure of the judged contest, try this one. Bring your models in early because voting starts Tuesday morning.

And finally on the model side of the menu we have the JUDGED COMPETITION. This is the crown jewel, the Olympics of railroad model building with all the guts and glory, the triumphs of winning, and the agony of defeat. Well, maybe that's overstating it a little. However, the models are subjected to technical judging in accordance with the Achievement Program guidelines and point scoring system. It's vigorous, but uniform and fair. For those unfamiliar with the system, you can view the actual guidelines we use by going to the NMRA web site.

Each of the five factors (construction, conformity, detail, appearance and, scratchbuilt) is judged separately by a judging team comprised of a team leader and at least two others. The team leaders and at least one of the other two are experienced and very familiar with the guidelines, and all judging is presided over and reviewed by Allen Gross, the National Chief Judge and myself. Prior to the start of judging, all judges are required to attend a refresher clinic presented by the chief judge. Another clinic on contest judging for prospective judges and interested attendees will be given on Tuesday evening between 7–8рм of the convention. With few exceptions, all of the folks involved in the judging have entered the contest before and know how much emotion is riding on each entry. They pledge to respect your model and do their best to be fair and give you the best possible score they can.

We try to keep the paperwork to a minimum, but because how you built your model is an important part of *how* we judge it, providing us with a good written description in the form requested is very important to achieving a good score. We typically have six to eight minutes to judge each factor of each model and need to make our evaluation efficiently. Likewise, writing volumes about your model can be similarly counterproductive because we don't have the time to read more than a paragraph or two and may miss something important if it's buried. My staff and I stand ready early in the week to answer questions or otherwise help you in filling out the forms, or if you choose to do that at home before the convention, which is actually a very good idea, we would be happy to assist you by a popular activity across the country, and phone or e-mail. Likewise, I will be giving another clinic entitled "Filling out the Forms to Finish First" on Monday night at 10-11рм.

While the competition and paperwork may seem intimidating to the newcomer, the rewards for winning are pretty nice. There are first, second, and third place awards in 11 model categories and 23, count 'em, 23

special awards, including four just for kitbashed models and the most prestigious of all the overall Best in Show or Gold Award. And, it's a great way to get your merit awards for the Achievement Program.

Sound daunting? Well it's really not so bad for newcomers. Just think, the contest is about what you can build—not who you know, how much you spend, or how many conventions you have attended A skilled first-time entrant can be the top award winner! So come on down. We don't bite and the water's fine.

The **PHOTO SHOOT-OFF** is next on the menu. This popular event is a judged competition for prints and slides. It includes six categories: Model Print - Color, Model Print - Black & White, Prototype Print -Color, Prototype – Black & White, Model - Slide, and Prototype - Slide.

Judging is done by an experienced team, who carefully evaluates entries on each of ten factors, including such aspects as impact, composition, artistic approach, lighting, and so forth, in accordance with a carefully laid out procedure that can be found at the NMRA web site. As with the judged model competition, the folks that do the photo contest take their job very seriously and strive to be as fair and uniform as possible in their evaluations. They've all been there, too.

A full spectrum of place awards await the winners in each category, plus a Best of Show, so start digging through your albums and slide trays and bring some of your favorites to Anaheim. They don't take up any room in your suitcases, and who knows, maybe you'll have throw out some of your old socks to make room for the award plaques on the way home.

The PASS CONTEST is another nice little affair for those creative folks who design and print passes for their model railroads. Judging is done by the photo folks, and first, second, and third place plaques await the winners. They don't take up too much room either, so why not take yours along?

Modular model railroading has become our contest menu features a competition dubbed the MODULE SHOWDOWN for those that are brought to the National Train Show on Friday and Saturday. However, they must be entered in the contest. They are evaluated by a team of judges at the show, and two sets of first, second, and third place awards are given out for modules build by individuals and groups.

The last selection on our menu of contest attractions, but certainly not the least, is the ARTS & CRAFTS COMPETITION. This popular event is aimed specifically at the spouse or significant other who may be involved in and practice various artistic or craft-type activities. The entries are evaluated by a team of judges based on construction and materials, complexity, finishing and display, and finally neatness.

Within this competition we have nine categories each with first, second, and third place awards: Railroadiana – original, pattern, and kit; Needlework - original, pattern, and kit; and General - original, pattern, and kit. Special awards include the Youth Award for best entry submitted by a person under 18 and the Best of Show Award.

And, if you think this is a slam dunk, think again. The competition is substantial with many return entrants, and the articles are gorgeous.

So there you have it, the whole enchilada. There are so many awards and plaques and categories and competitions that I literally need to spreadsheet to keep them straight. We, the contest staff, honestly want you to come to the room, choose the events that appeal to your interests and philosophies (a little competition, a lot, or none at all) and go for the gold. I will personally pledge to you that my staff and I will do our darnest to treat your entry, whatever it might be, with fairness and respect and in the events that are judged by my staff to render the fairest and most uniform score we can, so as I said before, come on in, the water's fine.
