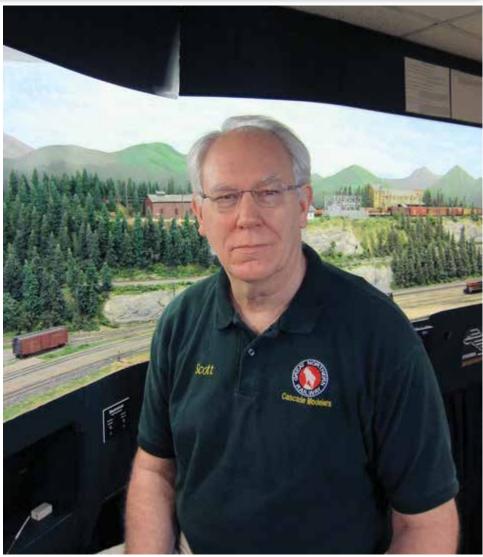

article like this say, "It's not the destination, it's the journey"? Those words are oh, so true. The journey defines how we get to our destinations. But perhaps more important are the people we meet along the way. People make the difference in how we learn, how much we learn, and how much fun we have in the process. So, this little article is not so much about me; it is about the people I need to thank for making this journey so much fun, enabling me to learn so much, and to do in this hobby what I have done.

Like so many, my model train hobby started at age four with a Lionel set. You know the one: a pair of Santa Fe F-units and a few freight cars. That was 70 years ago. It must have been a stretch for my parents, having just moved into a new post-war home. Dad put together a nice 4x8 plywood table, and I was off. Before long, there was a 2x8 addition, some turnouts, and some great accessories. That train set made a huge difference in my life. I loved everything about it. I spent hours in the basement, running the train and making changes in the arrangement and structures, mostly Plasticville. Sound familiar? My parents were always supportive of my interest in trains.

My Lionel trains lasted for ten years until a friend, Denny Thomson, decided he wanted to move to HO scale. I thought it was a great idea and, with my parents' permission, traded my Lionel equipment for enough HO items to build a small layout. My first engine was a Varney Great Northern F3. Little did I know that at age 14, I was starting down a lifelong path of interest in that railway. I didn't know at the time, or even for ten more years, that the Great Northern had paid for my birth due to my parents being involved in the biggest wreck in the history of the railroad. But that's another story.

The next five years were a time of learning about the hobby. The original 6x8 board from the Lionel times was converted to my HO layout. During that time, I met Larry Lauer, who many of you older members may remember because of his involvement in the NMRA. Larry lived only two blocks away and was



always generous with his time, answering my never-ending stream of questions.

That brings us to 1966 and the only 21-month period when I was not involved in model railroading. At age 20, I met a girl at college on a blind date. Eight days later, I proposed. She said "yes," and a year-and-a-half later, we were married. I never thought about trains during that period. Who's surprised? Of all the things I have done in my life, meeting her was the best thing that ever happened to me. I need to put this in perspective. I still had two years of college to complete. We had very little, but it didn't matter. Our honeymoon consisted of a long weekend in Northern Michigan. On the drive up North, we were traveling along when I suddenly stopped the car and hopped out.

I said "Look at that, it's an old passenger car with timber trucks and paper wheels." That was her first hint I loved trains. We have been married 53 years.

She has been to railroad yards all over the country, more Railroad Prototype Modeler meets and NMRA conventions than I can count, and has endured my long hours in the basement, the money that has gone to the layout, and everything else we modelers inflict on our partners. Despite all that, she has supported my hobby without reservation. She even helped build a fair portion of the approximate 5,000 trees on the layout. The layout and my MMR® would not exist without her support.

During the last 40 years, there have been many people who have helped me along the way. The most important is a friend, Jeff Higgins. Jeff lived in our neighborhood. When he was 13, he and his parents attended one of my first open houses. The layout was basically benchwork and track. I had a little Friday night group that helped in the construction. Jeff's mom called and asked if Jeff could

join our group. He did, and we put him to work. At 13, there was little that Jeff could not do as well as any adult. It has been more than 35 years since then, and Jeff has been involved every step of the way, especially helping me with problemsolving and getting ready for op sessions. I don't know where I would be without his support.

Almost 20 years ago, I was asked to join a Friday night group called the "Midnight Pocatello Yardmasters." The group has been around for about 35 years and is still going strong. There are typically around 22 members, as some come and go over the years. The members include many with fabulous layouts that we operate. I am the seventh member to receive an MMR®, with the first happening in 1984! The members are extremely good modelers, and I semi-jokingly tell people that our unofficial motto is "Excellence Through Intimidation." The reality is, everyone helps wherever they can, and we all are better modelers because of it. I am also proud the group has a history of helping families who have lost their model railroader and have no idea what they have or how to sell it. We have returned nearly \$100,000 to families in that effort. We only accept enough money to cover the expenses of the process. It is part of giving back to this great hobby.

I was privileged to work for Detroit Edison, now DTE. I am an engineer by education and worked in both fossil and nuclear power plants. Along the way, I transferred to the purchasing department, becoming responsible for all power plant purchases. However, the one thing I was fortunate enough to do over the years was handling most all the company's rail purchases. In addition to wreck and running repair contracts over time, I purchased about 8,000 cars, mostly high-side gons and a few U30Cs. I kid people that I am probably one of a very few modelers who have bought more real cars than models.

Finally, I have been caught up in what I believe is the biggest change in model railroading: prototype operation. In addition to what my Friday night group does, two people have taught me so much about the subject. The first is Jack Ozanich. To be blunt, if you did not know Jack, that is your loss. I was fortunate to attend many op sessions at Jack's place over the last ten or fifteen years. Jack was a retired railroad engineer.

Op sessions were always a minimum of eight hours, with no breaks. They were intense with every rule in force and all the paperwork, and Jack saw everything. I loved it. Not since college have I ever been in an environment where I learned so much. Jack had an unbounded passion for the railroad, and he was willing to pass it on. We lost Jack in 2020. I just hope I can apply what I learned from him to my op sessions.

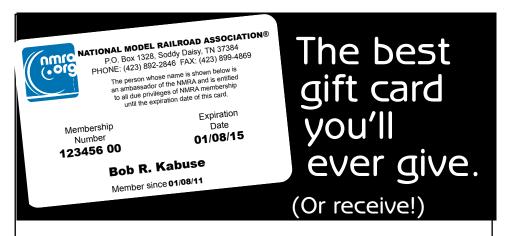
The other person is Doug Tagsold, who many know from his numerous articles about his various, fabulous model railroads. I have been fortunate to have operated on Doug's amazing layouts and have also been the beneficiary of the operating weekends Doug has organized, where my layout has been involved. I have had the pleasure of watching outstanding operators make my layout come alive, thanks to Doug.

That's the story. The path to my MMR® was a lot of work but mostly a lot of fun. However, the simple truth is that without the encouragement and support and sharing of information and

skills — by many people — I would most likely never have made it. So, thanks to all of you and for those of you who are still on the journey to MMR®, find those friends, those people who can help you get there. In the end, that is more important than the destination itself. For me, I just want one more time to watch that Lionel Santa Fe engine run around the circle and smell the ozone.

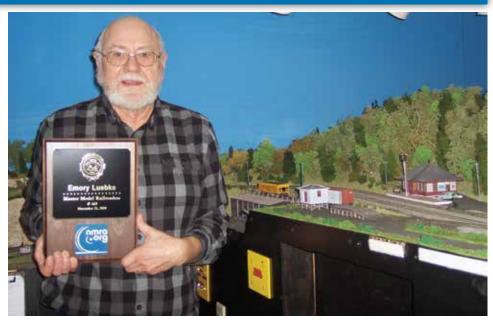

EMORY LUEBKE EARNS MASTER MODEL RAILROADER® #669

he railroad bug bit me at a very early age. The first thing I remember regarding railroads is that our car was first in line at a railroad crossing and a steam locomotive passed directly in front of our car, switching at a local paper mill. I stood up on the front seat and placed both my hands on the windshield so I could get a better look. This was in the early 1950s, way before seat belts and child car seats. Next came the Lionel train set at Christmas. It was only put up at Christmas for several years. Then my dad procured a portion of a neighbor's Lionel layout as the neighbor was moving out of state. This layout provided an opportunity for me to experiment with different track designs to service industries. Of course, I had the "Plasticville" buildings. Lionel buildings and accessories were out of my price range. Just prior to entering high school, my friend next door showed me the HO train set he had just obtained.

I was impressed by the cars with sprung trucks and being much more realistic-looking than the Lionel equipment. I was now set on getting into HO. After saving some money from my paper route, I purchased an Athearn train set from my local hobby shop. Yes, it was an F7 with Athearn's rubber-band drive. This locomotive was soon replaced with an Athearn GP7 with a gear drive. I was off and running in this new and more detailed HO scale. I purchased a Mantua Shifter and Mikado as kits and built them; the Shifter was \$7.95, and the Mike was \$12.95. My first HO layout was 4x6 with track just laid on plywood; next came a 5x8 with cork roadbed, but no scenery.

I was a member of a local O-scale club and attended a model railroad interest group at the Boys Brigade; the Boys Brigade is somewhat like the Boy Scouts. I attended both the Brigade model railroad group and the O-scale club through high school and a couple of years beyond. In these two organizations, I began to learn and develop my modeling skills with the help of many mentors. I was a leader for two years of the Boys Brigade model railroad interest group. Then cars and girls became the main focus, and model railroading took a back seat. I didn't actively



get back into model railroading until after marriage and purchasing a home. When we were house-hunting, my priority was the basement. My wife could take care of looking at the upstairs; I wanted to see how the basement was set up to allow building a model railroad. Several homes were rejected due to the basement having too many obstructions or being damp, making it not conducive to my requirements for building a model railroad in it.

I started my present layout in 1980 — a freelanced railroad named the Winnebago Rapids & Northern. This railroad is located in Wisconsin and interchanges with the Soo Line. I like being able to name towns and businesses/ industries after my railroad friends and relatives, and a freelanced railroad allows me to do so. The track is hand-laid except where hidden, then three-foot flex track was used. I like hand-laying track and find it relaxing. I also enjoy building kits, kitbashing, and scratchbuilding structures. Super-detailing locomotives is another part of the hobby I enjoy. Although I enjoy these, I never thought I was a good enough modeler to qualify for MMR®. Through the encouragement and support of Mary and Mark Preussler, both Master Model Railroaders®, I started down the road to MMR® in May 2009 with the Golden Spike award. A few times there was some discouragement, but Marv and Mark were always there with encouragement and got me fired up again. It was not easy for me to make it to MMR® status, but the challenge made me a better modeler.

While I was on the Board of Directors for the Winnebagoland Division of the NMRA, I took on the responsibility of Clinic Chairman and arranged clinicians for the Division meets and the Regional Convention held in Manitowoc, Wisconsin. I liked working with the clinicians and was fortunate to meet many talented people.

The most enjoyable part of the hobby for me is operations. I like the challenges of figuring out how to efficiently set out and pick up cars and the camaraderie it brings.

I have made many friends through the NMRA and had many wonderful times at Division, Region, and National Conventions. Seeing other layouts is always high on my list of enjoyable times at these events. It's great to see what others accomplish, and get ideas for improving my layout. Most of all, I like seeing people who I may only get to visit with during these events. The NMRA has brought many of us together, and I will always be thankful for that and the friends I have made.
